Suryia, a three-year-old orangutan was so depressed after losing his parents that he wouldn't eat. Moreover, he didn't respond to conventional medical treatment. In fact, his veterinarians thought he would die from sadness.

At wit's end, the veterinarians at Suryia's zoo in Northern California decided to try something a little less conventional. Earlier, they had found an older, sick dog named Roscoe roaming the zoo grounds who needed his own medical attention. They brought him to the animal treatment center – the very same clinic where Suryia was receiving treatment.

The two lost souls quickly bonded...and have been inseparable ever since! Their favorite pastime is swimming -- although Suryia is a little afraid of the water, Roscoe is always there to help his best friend do their laps.

Together, 24 hours a day, they each found a new reason to live and thrive. Together they have found joy and the value of friendship. Just as highlighted in my documentary, they are "made for each other."

I hope that in these dog days of summer, as well as all year round, this story brings you joy and laughter and that you embrace the value of friendship.
