As you may remember, a few years ago I was honored to make a \$1.5 million gift to Tri-County Animal Rescue to endow its new 9,000-square-foot state-of-the-art, fully equipped veterinary center. The facility, which I can proudly say now bears my name, is the only clinic that offers low-cost, and many times free, health and medical services to thousands of low-income families in Palm Beach, Broward, and Miami-Dade Counties who cannot afford such vital care for their pets. In the four years, it has been open, the Lois Pope Pet Clinic has treated more than 20.000 animals.

I bring this up because I learned recently from our dear friend and Board member, Suzi Goldsmith, about Parker- a Shih Tzu found on the Tri-County grounds after being thrown over the fence like a piece of trash in the middle of the night.

Parker's hair was matted all over her body, and it was thick with feces and urine. The mats around her face were so tight they kept her eyes open -- she wasn't even able to blink -- and she was in so much pain she yelped when someone touched her. She had to be sedated just to have three pounds of her matted hair removed. And once the hair was gone, Tri-County doctors were able to see just how neglected Parker had been: sores all over her body, many with maggots crawling through them, as well as anemia, infection, parasites, and dehydration.

Yet, without the expertise, resources, and specialized equipment at the Lois Pope Pet Clinic, Parker may have become just another statistic – one of an astonishing 10 million animals who are abused to death each year. Moreover, without the Pet Clinic, animals who have been displaced or lost due to hurricanes, wildfires, tornadoes, flooding, and other extreme weather conditions may not be rescued or receive the care they need. And thanks to the Pet Clinic, pets don't have to be abandoned because their owners lack access to affordable medical care.

For all these reasons – and for all that the Lois Pope Pet Clinic still needs to do to treat and save dogs, cats, rabbits, birds, and other animals, I immediately said "yes" when Suzi asked me to serve as the chairperson of Tri-County's Brunch and Bark on Sunday, Nov. 20 at Trump International. How could I not help such an impressive and indispensable organization fulfill its mission?

Fern's temperature was so low it would not read on a thermometer. With heat support, her temperature returned to normal. Unfortunately, that was not the end of Fern's troubles. She was having difficulty maintaining her blood glucose levels and body temperature. After the Clinic staff discovered that Fern's red blood cells were fighting each other, she received an emergency blood transfusion that saved her life. Now she is a happy and healthy girl!
