This month, LIFE is going to the dogs...military hero dogs, that is!

Dictionary.com defines the word "hero" as one who "has distinguished courage or ability, admired for his brave deeds and noble qualities...who, in the opinion of others, has heroic qualities or has performed a heroic act..."

I can't think of individuals who better epitomize and actualize this definition than the hundreds, if not thousands of canines who serve as military working dogs. They serve

alongside their human military service members on the battlefield - quite often right on the front lines - sniffing out IEDS and other bombs. They come under enemy fire. They search in small spaces and buildings to make sure they are safe for soldiers to enter. In fact, it is estimated that because of their unparalleled abilities of smell and detection, each military working dog saves the lives of between 150-200 warriors.

And when they are not keeping soldiers out of harm's way, these dogs offer companionship and a sense of normalcy in circumstances that for the overwhelming majority of us are simply inconceivable.

Last month, thanks to American Humane Association and the support of all of us at LIFE, President Obama signed the National Defense Reauthorization Act that included for the first time provisions to ensure that these courageous canines are returned home to the U.S. after their service is completed.

On February 2, we all have the wonderful opportunity to meet a few of these four-legged champions (and their twolegged colleagues) at the AHA's Tribute to America's Military Heroes. Together with American Humane's chairman John Payne and president and CEO Robin Ganzert, I am privileged to co-host the prestigious event, scheduled for 6-8:30 pm at the Brazilian Court Hotel, which will serve to launch the AHA's new Center for Military Affairs.

Under the leadership of Captain Jason Haag, USMC (ret.), the Center will be home to such programs as the K-9 Battle Buddies, which helps military K-9 teams on and off the battlefield; Wags for Patriots, which assists returning veterans in coping with the hidden wounds of war; Operation Purple camps, where children and family members coping with post-traumatic stress interact with warm, playful, and loving therapy dogs; and American Humane's groundbreaking research on PTS and service dogs.

In addition to welcoming these courageous canines, we will also meet USMC Col. Scott D. Campbell, Commanding Officer of the Wounded Warrior Regiment at Quantico; Sgt. Matt Eversmann, inspiration for the movie "Black Hawk Down" and AHA National Ambassador; and Col. Dick Bauer, the decorated Vietnam Veteran and AHA Ambassador.
